
#### Avraham Ben Marhev Ben Yaakov Zadka Hazfri (1928-1852)

فيما يلي أورد ما جاء في تفسير عربي لهذه الآية في مخطوط محفوظ في المكتبة الوطنية الروسية في سانت بطرسبورغ الغنية بمثل هذه المخطوطات، قرابة ١٣٥٠ مخطوطا. إنه المخطوط 17 Sam III المخطوط التفسير والاستشهادات من ناقص لمسألة الخليقة، يستعين بعلم الفلك، ويضم ثماني ورقات بمقاس ١٧x٢٧ سم، التفسير والاستشهادات من التوراة مكتوية بالعربية وبالرسم العربي وتظهر علامة شبيهة بالدّة العربية على معظم الكلمات العبرية المقتبسة ولم أستطع إبرازها لأسباب تقنية. لا ذكر في المخطوط لهوية مؤلف هذا التفسير وقل الأمر ذاته بالنسبة لاسم الناسخ والزمان والمكان. في الكاتالوج اليدوي المتوفر في المكتبة ذكر القرن الثامن عشر بدون الإشارة إلى أية مصادر ويبدو لي، انطلاقا من الكتابة، أنه قد يعود إلى القرن اللاحق، القرن التاسع عشر. صفحات هذا المخطوط غير متتالية كما يتضح من تسلسل الأمور أولا ومن استخدام نهج الد catchwords أي كتابة الكلمة الأولى في الصفحة التالية في أسفل الصفحة السابقة. يبدأ المخطوط بالكلمات: "اربعه واعلم ان الجوهر الاول هو/ (هذا الخط المائل يدل على نهاية سطر وبداية آخر) والارض كانت مغمورة بذلك/لقوله تعالى عز من قايل/". والكلمات الأخيرة في المخطوط: "وقد سماهم الله/تعالى في كتابه العزيز فيشون وجيحون وهدقل/وفرت ثم بعد تمام دلك اخد الله تعالى ادم واقره/في الجنه واوصاه ان ياكل من كل اثمار الجنه الا دلك الشجرة المعرفه" (المعرفه هي كاتش ورد). في كل صفحة واحد وعشرون سطرا.

הנני מפרסם בזה לראשונה שתי תשבחות המיוחסות ללְמַעְ'רְבי אל\_בַהְלול לאור חמשה עשר מקורות עיקריים, שמונה כתבי-יד שומרוניים, כתב-יד ערבי המצוי בספריית האוניברסיטה ע"ש המלך סְעוּד, ושישה טקסטים הקיימים במרשתת. התשבחות כתובות בערבית הקרובה יותר ללשון הדיבור מאשר ללשון הספרות. תרגום לעברית מצורף למקור וכן סקירה לשונית של המקור הערבי. התשבַחַת הראשונה נושאת את הכותרת "זאת הינזרוּת מועְ'רַבּית" הכוללת מאה ושני בתי שיר, ואילו התשבחת השנייה לא ניתנה לה כותרת והיא בת תשעים ושמונה בתי שיר לפי כתב-היד השמור במנצ'סטר והוא שימש לעיל בפנים המהדורה. שתי תשבחות אלה מושרות לפי שתי מנגינות ידועות בפיוט השומרוני: אין אֶל פרט לאלוהים הוי עם העד; קום ושׂים פניך אל האל לפני סיום חייך.

Dating back more than 2,500 years, the Samaritans are the longest-lived religious sect in Israelite/Jewish history; today, their traditions, beliefs, and practices are still maintained by a small community of approximately eight hundred souls. As they have for nearly their entire existence, many Samaritans currently live in the vicinity of the biblical city of Shechem (Nablus), near Mount Gerizim on the West Bank. The mountain is central to Samaritan worship and is the site of the group's annual Passover sacrifice.

The present work, known by its Samaritan Aramaic title *Ishban kashtah* (=*Heshbon kushta*; True Reckoning), features a series of calendrical tables written in the distinctive Samaritan alphabet, with explanatory text provided in Arabic script. The Samaritan calendar, like the Jewish one, is lunisolar, adding extra (lunar) months seven times every nineteen years in order to ensure that the Passover festival coincides with the (solar) spring. According to Samaritan tradition, the secrets of the calendar and its calculations were transmitted by God through the angels to Adam, from whom they passed to Enoch, Noah, Shem, Eber, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Phinehas, and the priestly line, which continues to safeguard them to this day. Indeed, the Samaritan High Priest issues a new calendar every six months, and each male in the community is required to secure a copy for himself.

Precious few manuscripts of the *Ishban kashtah* from such an early date as this one have survived. The codex is further distinguished by the presence on its first page of a diagram composed of concentric circles that give the numerical values of the Arabic consonants, the stations of the moon, the zodiacal signs, and the four seasons, among other data points. If the owner recorded on p. 4 is to be identified with a member of the famous Danfi scribal family active in Shechem in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries that would lend even further prestige to this already important witness to late medieval Samaritan religious culture.


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

The Samaritans are a small tribe, totaling about 400 people and upwards who live mostly in the town of Nablus, on the steps of Mt. Gerizim in Jordan, or in Holon, Israel. This tribe is known as one of the smallest among all the tribes in the world. It is also renown for its faithfulness to its religion, to the laws of their tradition from long gone generations, and distinguishing the Samaritans from the other peoples and tribes in the

The Samaritan tribe is composed of five big families, as follows:

1) The High Priest's family "COHANIM"
forming the tribe of Levi, dating
back to Abraham's son Levi. This
family is composed of about 100
people to-day, all living in Nablus,
Jordan. The Cohanim fulfill their
duties in the tribe as singers, in
the church - in the prayers - and
are responsible for all the religeous problems of the tribe. The oldest of the priests act as high priest
and head of the whole tribe. This
duty is not hereditary but passes on
to the oldest priest in the priest's
tribe.

iquo Hobrew writing and Aramito, written mostly seven hunared years ago. They are mostly written in the form of songe, praises to the Lord, to the ancestors if they can get to the Cave where it is said an ancestor is burried, to Joseph the right-sous, if they are near his monument, in Nablus, Jordan, and to Miszer the Cohen, son of Abaron brother of Moses, if they are near his buriel place which is in Wartengar Neblus, Jordan, and also others.

There is also a special book for happy occasions, including special songs for the bridgeroom during the marriages coremony the circumcision, ongagement, etc. There are also songs for a special party given on the occasion of the birth of hoses, our kabbi. According to this book the Arabs have also started to write similar books for their bappy occasions. Following is an example of the old Hebrew writing, which the Torah given by hoses to the children of Israel, was written in. (English letters show pronounciation).




#### **From the Editor**

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





The Samaritans in Historical, Cultural and Linguistic Perspectives, J. Dušek (ed.) - book review Journal of Northwest Semitic Languages, Volume 46 Number 1, Nov 2020, p. 105 - 109 This volume follows in the footsteps of previous volumes on the Samaritans, published in the well-known series Studia Samaritana. These volumes stem from the international congresses of the Société d'études samaritaines that are held in different locations every four years. This volume, like its predecessors, cover the wide spectrum of Samaritan studies. It starts with some contributions on the Hebrew Bible and the Samaritan Pentateuch (three essays). Thereafter, follow sections on Roman-Byzantine and Rabbinic studies (three essays), Arabic studies (four essays), studies on the Samaritans in Modern and Contemporary times (four essays), and some linguistic studies (two essays). The scope of this book is motivated by the editor, Jan Dušek, in the preface: "The Samaritans and their culture witnessed history over more than two millennia and we can be spectators of the development of their community in modern times. The Samaritans, their Pentateuch and Mount Gerizim represent a kind of historical constant in the southern Levant during numerous historic events and overthrows, perhaps even despite many



of them" (p. v). Right from the outset one could say that such a wide scope will necessarily lead to a somewhat patchy treatment of the very long historical period. One should therefore not expect deep and exhaustive studies in each of the subsections; rather, the contributions represent the state of the field as expressed at the Prague conference of 2016 where these papers were delivered.

The Contribution of Variants Due to Graphic Similarity to Textual Criticism of the Pentateuch This study focuses on variant readings due to graphic similarity between the Masoretic text and the Samaritan Pentateuch. Its first and foremost aim is to create a comprehensive corpus of all these variants, to study each one independently and to examine them from a broad perspective. Analysis of the findings in the present study was carried out using methods available to all scholars of the biblical text. Yet in addition, the study incorporates methods from the palaeographic realm and in this respect, it marks a new direction. The many researchers who have dealt with variants due to graphic similarity as part of the discussion of the textual history of the bible have made little use of knowledge that has accrued over the past decades on the development of the Hebrew script and the square script to explain specific phenomena or general processes. Therefore, my work will hopefully add to the research of textual criticism in all its dimensions and to biblical research itself. Following an introduction to the study which includes its aims, a review of research on relevant topics and an outline, the second chapter presents the textual findings. This chapter surveys all the variants due to graphic similarity between the Masoretic text and the Samaritan Pentateuch and gathers variants from additional textual witnesses, primarily the Qumran scrolls and the Septuagint. Each difference is examined independently through a philological analysis of the variants, their process of development and an evaluation of which version is superior. Finally, the chapter presents a statistical analysis of the data, including, for example, a survey of the interchanging letters, the frequency of the interchanges, the number of superior readings in each textual witness and the frequency of

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agreement between the Septuagint and each textual witness. The third chapter treats the paleographic background of the variants and examines the shapes of the interchanging letters during each stage of development of the three relevant scripts-Hebrew script, square script and Samaritan script. Through this process it determines an estimated dating of...
