The size of the Samaritan community in Palestine shrank dramatically in the 19th century. This was the result, among other factors, of the official hostility of the Ottoman Empire. The decline was so severe that by 1876, the entire Samaritan population numbered no more than 135 individuals. The threat of eradication looming over this ancient community actually served to attract a frenzied wave of attention, and brought about an influx of European scholars and travelers eagerly seeking to acquire all available information regarding Samaritan culture, and to purchase Samaritan manuscripts whenever possible. Objects such as the present scroll were produced in Nablus in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, and sold to tourists as a means of raising money to materially support the community and ensure its physical survival.





leather binding. 1886 Manuscript commentary on the second section of the Book of Genesis (Bereishit), from Vayetze to Vayechi. The name of the book is "Guidance for the Asker of Questions" (Hadrachat HaShoel b'She'elot), written by Masalem Al-Danafi, or Mishlomo ben Margion HaDanafi, and was completed by his nephew Ibrahim (Avraham) ben Yaakov HaDanafi, who lived in 1778. Arabic handwriting with quotes in purple, antique Samaritan script. The margins have notes, often with the signature of the scribe who mentions things from his father. At the end is a poem praising scribes and their books. The two first leaves and 122-123, and the three last leaves of the original work were replaced with other leaves from the same scribe, probably based on a request from the book's purchaser. Pages 19-20 have sketched tables for the table of contents but they were left blank apart from the third page, where the Samaritan alphabet is written both normally and with a mirror script. There is a long inscription in the colophon which reveals a bit of the scribe's identity and opens a window into the lives of Samaritans of the time and their genealogy: "The end of the writing of this book, the second section of the commentary on the first book of the Torah, was on the eve of Wednesday, the 20th of the ninth month, parallel to the 3rd day of the Khanun month, the first of the year 6326, which is the 3526 of their counting (3 December 1886), by ... Salama ben Amran (Amram Kohen Gadol, 1855-1874) ben Salama (Shlomo Kohen Gadol 1798-1855), ben Gazal Hamam (Tuvya Kohen Gadol 1751-1787)....I wrote this honored book at the order of my maternal cousin...dear brother Yosef ben Yosef ben Salama and his brother Fiez ben Ashhak (Yitzhak) ben Yosef (ben Margan-Av Sakua) HaDanafit from the house of Ephraim ben Yosef

HaTzaddik...and know that you abide by that date, since the writing of the book is for the remembered brothers, from Saba's side...Gazal HaKohen, who already ordered it in writing, a commentary of this first book is in two parts, divided between them. Because they loved the commentary they each wanted complete copies so I wrote for them this second section again, I began and finished in a short time."




The scriptures of the Samaritans consist only of the first five books of the Hebrew Bible, i.e. the Pentateuch, or Torah, and their script is thought to be one of the earliest forms of writing. Leaves were often brought back from a visit to the Holy Land as a religious souvenir, as the inscription on the frame indicates.

This manuscript leaf is very similar to Cambridge MS Add 1846, dated Nablus, early twelfth century, and considered one of the earliest manuscripts of the Samaritan Pentateuch.

"Given me on 28th of Nov. 1876 by the Rev.d H.L. Puxley, Vicar of Kimbolton. He was a great traveller. He spent a month at Nablous & made a warm friend of the Samaritan High Priest, who,



on his departure, presented him with two leaves of an ancient copy of the Samaritan Pentateuch. 

The Samaritan Shavuot holiday always went out on Sunday, and this is due to the difference between the counting of days between Passover and Shavuot between the Jews and According to the Samaritans, we must count from the Sabbath day after the Passover holiday, and the holiday will apply on the 7th day of the Omer count. For comparison - in the Jewish community we count immediately after the Passover holiday (and not from the first Shabbat day). As a result of this count of the Samaritans, the Shavuot holiday will apply to the world on Sunday - following the double Sabbath (Saturday + Sunday), the Samaritans take advantage of this holiday to travel to Mount Gerizim and spend holidays together with

On the eve of Shavuot, which always comes out on Saturday night as said, the Samaritans do not eat hot food because they do not cook on Saturday, so the evening table holidays consists of many types of cheese and a rich selection of salads.

Between Saturday and Sunday night, just before 4 am, the Samaritans get up, and keep the pilgrimage commandments. The Samaritans are on foot to the top of the mountain to carry a prayer there. The pilgrimage is accompanied by the singing of the sea which the Samaritans sing during the walk. At the end of this prayer, the priests visit the Samaritan father's daughter and bless them with the blessing of happy holiday

Like every pilgrimage (Shavuot Sukkot and Passover), the Samaritans stop for prayer at 6 points:

1. The place of the " rocks ", The 12 stones Yehoshua Ben Noon placed when entering Israel
2. place altar " Adam " and " drink " in us.
3. Place " Givat Olam "- According to the Samaritan faith this is the spiritual center of the world.
4. A place " God will see " - where there was the elk that was seen in the tangle to Abraham and he sacrificed instead of Isaac
5. Altar " Yitzhak "- The place where Abraham was standing to take Isaac.

6. Place " Noah Altar " - The altar that Noah put down after he left the box.

At every point they carry a prayer and hold the ceremony of raising the book of the Torah by the priest.

The Samaritan pilgrimage is very loved by photographers as it is a spectacular spectacle of hundreds of people, all dressed in white against the background of the sunrise. Photographer Idan Gross captured a spectacular picture of the pilgrimage.

At the end of the pilgrimage, the Samaritans gather at their homes, and host the family of the priesthood. The full priesthood family is hosted by the leaders of the families in the community, and welcomes the blessing of happy holiday The hospitality is full of rich closeness and doesn't end before having a toast Arak, the work of the Samaritans, with the blessing of " a hundred years of your



The Samaritan Passover by **G Robinson Lees.**

The Samaritans, the oldest and smallest sect in the world, now numbering less than 200 souls, still worship on their holy mountain, Gerizim, which overlooks Nablous, in the vale of Shechem, where they peacefully reside.

The Passover ceremony is the most interesting of all their ordinances, and is still conducted on the same plan as set forth in Exodus xii. The tents are pitched as near as possible in two lines, the most important, that of the tabernacle, oblong in shape, being close to the place of sacrifice, and adjoining it the one belonging to the High Priest Jacob. On the evening of the ninth day of their sojourn in the holy place, and the fifteenth of the month Nisan, the men having already

prepared the lambs for sacrifice by care and constant washing so that there should be no blemish (Exodus xii. 4), the final preparations are complete.

The men and boys are dressed in white cotton shirts and trousers, and the women, who remain all the while in the tents, put on their best clothes.

Fire is placed in a trench opposite the entrance to the tabernacle tent, over which two caldrons are fixed containing water, which is gradually heated during the reading of the law. Near to the end of the trench away from the tabernacle is a circular pit bordered by loose stones, about six feet deep and three feet in diameter, in which the fire is prepared for the burning of the sacrifice.

Two hours before sunset the male portion of this ancient people meet in the tabernacle tent, with the exception of the "Shochetim," the young men whose duty it is to kill the lambs and watch the boiling water, and two others who attend to the fire in the pit. The "law" is then read with their faces turned towards the ruins of the temple on the top of the mountain. Many visitors from the city below cluster round the white-robed men to witness the proceedings, some of whom have come with the purposed intention of creating a disturbance. Officers and soldiers from the Turkish garrison are there to preserve order, a very necessary precaution, which has to be paid for, but could not be dispensed with without abandoning altogether the Feast.

At sunset the reading of the law is finished, and as the lambs are brought to the "Shochetin," the rest of the Samaritans gather round the victims. At a given signal each lamb is seized, thrown on its back and the knife drawn once across its throat. This is quite enough, as the blood spurts from the wound, the pascal lamb rolls over and after a brief struggle, expires. A shout of joy rises from the Samaritans, and counter cries of derision from the Moslem spectators, who have been trying to push their way into the enclosure made by the band of faithful worshippers, but happily prevented by their broad backs closely packed together.


The foreheads of the boys who form the inner circle are smeared with blood, and the men embrace and kiss each other with congratulations, rejoicing that the lambs of their redemption have been slain. After they have been examined by the High Priest, to see if properly killed and without blemish, and pronounced dead, boiling water was taken from the caldrons and poured over them; the young men then set to work to pull off the wool. When this is finished the entails are removed and burnt near the end of the trench, and the carcasses prepared on spits- poles about two yards long- for the pit of fire. After they have been placed in the flame a cover of wet earth is put over the mouth of the pit to keep in the heat, and the roasting continues until midnight.

The men then adjourn to the tents, and the boys amuse themselves in various ways, but all assemble in their respective families to receive the unleavened bread and bitter herbs that are taken round to each member of the Samaritan community. They are given to visitors as well, all of whom, if friendly and well-disposed, are hospitably treated, for this is a festive season. From the High Priest downwards all are very pleased to talk of their festival, and answer questions with evident pride and gratification at the interest taken in their ancient custom. Few strangers linger on the mountain to view the final scene, where all stand round the smoking masses of meat as they are brought from the pit, and, with their loins girded and staves in their hands, they hastily swallow every scrap of the feast (Exodus xii. 10, 11). On no account will they give a portion of this precious food to any but their own people. It is said that on one occasion a Moslem stole a piece, but was instantly seized and his throat tightly held until the morsel was squeezed out.

The number of lambs killed varies according to the number and wealth of the people. Poor families join together for one; while those who can afford it provide one for their own family. At the time of my visit, seven were killed and eaten.

As there was a large number of onlookers who could with difficulty be kept from interrupting the sacrifice itself, it was deemed prudent to omit the sprinkling of the doorposts with blood. Even as it was the tabernacle tent was torn down; and the disorder would have further increased and imperiled the Feast itself if the men had left the slain animals before they were deposited in the fire. Yet an excuse was available for this one act of omission. The High Priest told me that for two reasons it was unnecessary: first, because there was no longer any need to particularly mark the houses of his people on account of an impending disaster; and secondly, that the blood of last year's sacrifice was still visible on the tent-poles.

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### 'The Samaritan Passover –

When the guard of Turkish soldiers is sufficiently strong to maintain order, and permit the Samaritans to meet in the open air, the law is read as they stand inside a circle of stones. At sunset they assemble in this enclosure for the Passover, and the men, facing the high priest, recite exodus XII., 6. The lambs are seized by the Shochetim, examined by the high priest, and slain: then hastily prepared for roasting in the pit of fire'



ABSTRACT

Samaritans suffered several persecutions through the centuries. Josephus recorded two such events during the Hellenistic period. The first he dated to the time of Ptolemy I or Ptolemy VI in Alexandria and the second to the time of John Hyrcanus in Shechem and Gerizim. This chapter seeks to answer the question whether these accounts present real persecutions or ancient literary topoi of persecutions.






Abstract

Samaritans as a group within the ranges of ancient ‘Judaisms’ are often mentioned in Talmud and Midrash. As comparable social-religious entities, they are regarded ambivalently by the Rabbis. First, they were viewed as Jews, but from the end of the Tannaitic times, and especially after the Bar Kokhba revolt, they were perceived as non-Jews, not reliable about different fields of Halakhic concern. Rabbinic writings reflect on this change in attitude and describe a long ongoing conflict and a growing anti-Samaritan attitude. The article analyzes several dialogues between rabbis and Samaritans transmitted in the Midrash on the book of Genesis, Bereshit Rabbah. In four larger sections, the famous Rabbi Me’ir is depicted as the counterpart of certain Samaritans. The analyses of these discussions try to show how rabbinic texts avoid any direct exegetical dispute over particular verses of the Torah, but point to other hermeneutical levels of discourse and rejection of Samaritan claims. These texts thus reflect a remarkable understanding of some Samaritan convictions, and they demonstrate how rabbis denounced Samaritanism and

refuted their counterparts. The Rabbi Me'ir dialogues thus are an impressive literary witness to the final stages of the parting of ways of these diverging religious streams.
