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### **The Treasure of Samaritan Folk Tales**

**Translated by Haseeb Shehadeh**

This book consists of one hundred and ninety-two short stories in Arabic, almost all of which are taken from Samaritan oral folklore. Required remarks and clarifications are added in footnotes (over three hundred) or in parentheses. This book is particularly intended for Arab readers, who usually know very little about the Samaritans, who number today eight hundred and eighty souls and live on Mount Gerizim in the city of Nablus and in the city of Holon, south of Tel Aviv.

The first part of these stories, translated from Modern Hebrew into Modern Standard Arabic, were published a decade ago in periodicals such as *A. B. -The Samaritan News* and electronic sites like *Samaritan Update*. The lion's share of these stories, or anecdotes, was either narrated to Benyamim Tsedaka (b. 1944) or recorded or written down in the Arabic dialect of Nablus. Benyamim Tsedaka rendered the Arabic material into Hebrew, revised the Hebrew stories, and

published them. It goes without saying that publishing these stories in their original languages, namely Palestinian Nabulsi Arabic and Modern Hebrew, will serve as significant linguistic data for research.

The stories are characterised by such features as the presence of an invisible wish, supernatural motives, puns, pedantry, repetition, the presence of three heroes, and direct discourse between the characters. In such a traditional genre we find at the end of the story a solution that favours the Samaritans. The Samaritans' power, represented as a rule by a Cohen (a Samaritan priest), nullifies the effects of sorcery and witchcraft performed by others. Sometimes the mythical motif is mixed with reality. At the core of most of these stories lies the shrewdness of the Samaritan in getting out of predicaments and difficulties.

The events of the vast majority of the stories, told by more than fifty people, range from the beginning of the nineteenth century to the present day. This included the period of the high priests, starting with Salāma Ghazāl Ishāq (1798-1855) and continuing down to the current high priest, ʿAbdullāh Wāṣif Tawfīq, consecrated in 2013. These stories are presented in the present book according to the date of their publication in *A. B. -The Samaritan News*.

The first twenty-one stories are found in their Hebrew original in the book:

The twenty-second story revolves around the famous hermit Mariam, the daughter of the high priest ʿImrān. It is quoted from a manuscript of the well-known history book of the 14<sup>th</sup> century Samaritan chronicler Abu Al-Faṭḥ al-Sāmīriyy, a source which I have at my disposal.

The story was written in Middle Arabic. The stories that carry the numbers 23 to 128, were published in Hebrew in the issues of *A. B. -The Samaritan News*. I translated them into MSA and published them, as mentioned above. They can be found via search engines by giving the title of the story and the name of the translator, Haseeb Shehadeh. On the other hand the last stories 129-192 were rendered into Arabic by me at the end of 2022 and the beginning of 2023.

After mentioning the title, the name of the storyteller in Arabic is indicated, followed by his Hebrew equivalent, some brief information about him, the issue of *A. B. -The Samaritan News*, the date of its publication, and the relevant page numbers. Finally, I refer the reader to a recently published three-volume work entitled:

It should be noted that there are three texts included in my book that, though not among the stories, are closely related to their contents. They are numbers 42, 87, and 109, written by the editors of *A. B. -The Samaritan News*, Binyamim Tsedaka and his brother Yefet.

I hope Samaritan Folk Tales will be a core text to be followed by another, comprising an Arabic translation of the remaining number of similarly interesting Samaritan folk stories.

In numerous places I have added vocalization marks in order to facilitate reading for those who are not specialists in standard Arabic grammar; as is well known, there are many readers of this kind. I hope that this volume will serve as the nucleus of a subsequent work that will contain an Arabic translation of the remaining Samaritan folktales.

Following this introduction, the four chapters are presented followed by 192 stories:

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The auction company "Kedem" in Jerusalem offered a 19th-century painting of the abode

It is not clear how "preferably" determined the starting price. "Before" the crime to write the entire collection to the catalog. The catalog includes a full description of each item, at the end of each additional description an estimate of the price of each item. According to the author's estimate, the price of the painting is significantly lower than the stated amount. But it is the right of the auction company to present each item at



any price you find appropriate - and if you find a buyer for it - won, also won the original collectors.

Many paintings of the abode and tools by Samaria artists have been carried out for centuries. They have been sold to visitors and guests of the community for generations. Continuing this art to this day.

The sources of the paintings are the structure of the abode and its contents embroidered on the 16th-century man cave located in the Great Synagogue on the Hargarzim. There is a bag for a Torah book made of gold and copper, on it is filled with the pictures of the Tabernacle and its contents.

In the Jewish Museum in New York there is a second bag, even from the 16th century. These three items inspired the paintings of the abode and its tools. In the nineties of the twentieth century, the brothers Yitzhak, an object and opened Beni Marahiv Ben Shelah from the Hargarzim donated a bag of Torah book with drawings of the instruments, to the synagogue in the Hargarazim, engraved on it in small sizes.

As said, there are quite a few paintings of the instruments by Israeli artists who are yeast, more colorful and less colorful. The most spectacular in its colorfulness and precision is a painting found in the Valmadena Collection in London. Another beautiful painting in the collection of Girton College, Cambridge.

All the paintings reflect the way of thinking of the Israeli Shrine tradition regarding the shape of the abode and its properties.

In the frame around the planks of the courtyard columns of the abode are painted. North - 10; South - 10; East - 20; West - 20 60 for a grand total.

Within the inner frame in yellow, there is a frame in red at the top of the painting, a frame in red and blue that separates the holly and the holiest of holies and the excess parts of the dwelling.

In the upper part - the Temple of the Saints - are located from right to left: Moshe headquarters, the two cherubim above the Ark of the Testimony and Aharan headquarters. Below them in yellow it is written: Shamsi of the Holy Tabernacle, Friday, Becky, Azi = The Three Great Priests [after Elazar, Phinchas, Abisha] the last before the demolition of the Tabernacle, which occurred during the days of the Azi's tenure. Metot Moshe and Aharan predicted according to the writing on Metot Aharan: "And brought out a flower, and a booze will sprout and germinate almonds".

In the lower part of the sacred frame, they were drawn from right to left: Petah Ahl Moed, the altar of the locust, the altar of N[h]sheth, the lamp, under the lamp on the left, drug incense tool. All these tools are allowed to touch only for Benny Aharan. The rest of the tools are allowed to touch also to the Levi clan members.

In the lower half of the large frame rows up, from right to left: Aharan clothes [in yellow] - the vest; Aharan clothes under the vest, the sink.

At the bottom of the frame in red and brown, from right to left: tools used in sacrifice, spoons, forks, trumpets. In the middle: the altar rose, ["heavy" cups].

Surprisingly that the painting doesn't include the shalahan, the kaprat, the perekat, the sheets, the sheets of goats and more.

Description: **A rare early survival of a Samaritan Bible.**

An ancient Israelite people historically centered on Mount Gerizim near Shechem (Nablus), the origins of the Samaritans are shrouded in obscurity. According to the Samaritans, they descend from the Northern Kingdom of Israel. Modern scholars disagree as to their exact origins and the precise period when Samaritanism and Judaism diverged, but during the Second Temple period a deep enmity developed between Jews and Samaritans as each claimed to continue the authentic tradition of biblical religion. Like Jews, the Samaritans have preserved their own version of the Bible, largely limited to the text of the Pentateuch. The Samaritan Pentateuch is traditionally written in the Samaritan alphabet (a descendant of Paleo-Hebrew) and preserves a version of the Pentateuch that in many places aligns with the Septuagint (the Greek translation of the Jewish text) and with versions found among the Dead Sea Scrolls, making it central to Pentateuchal textual criticism. However, it also contains a number of significant differences, especially on points relating to Samaritan origins and worship. Most notably, the Samaritan text includes among the Ten Commandments the imperative to build an altar on Mount Gerizim.



The two folios represented here contain the text corresponding to Num. 33:23–35:7, recounting the stages of the Israelites' journey through the wilderness, the boundaries of the Land of Canaan, and the designation of Levitical cities (including cities of refuge). Over the centuries, Western travelers to Nablus occasionally obtained, by gift or purchase, individual leaves from the Samaritan High Priest or community. In this case, the extremely rare leaves were purchased by the American abolitionist and Congregational minister William Weston Patton (1821–1889), who later served as president of the Chicago Theological Seminary. Patton played a notable role in the antislavery movement in the United States, helping to organize and present the 1862 Chicago memorial urging President Abraham Lincoln to issue the Emancipation Proclamation, one of the most influential expressions of Northern civic and moral pressure in the months before the decree.

### Physical Description

Single bifolium (276 x 220 mm); black ink on parchment; in Samaritan majuscule (mujallas) book hand, unvocalized, as customary; single column; clear word-spacing and paragraphing typical of medieval Samaritan book hand; close comparanda include Cambridge UL Add. 1846 (early 12th century), widely regarded as among the earliest

extant Samaritan Pentateuch codices. Text: Leaf I: Num. 33:23–33:46 (r) and 33:47–34:3 (v). Leaf II: Num. 34:4–34:18 (r) and 34:19–mid-35:7 (v).

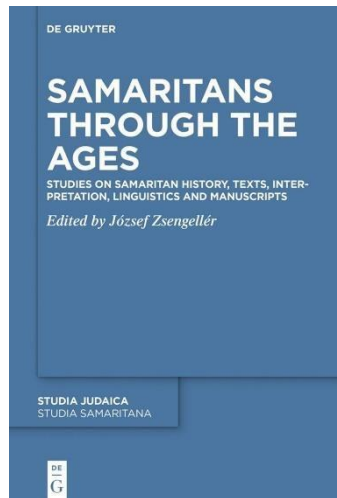
#### **Summary**

This Element explores constructions of Israelite identity among Jewish, Samaritan Israelites, and Christian authors in Late Antiquity, especially early Late Antiquity. It identifies three major strategies for claiming an Israelite identity between these three groups: a 'biological' strategy, a 'biology plus' strategy, and an 'abiological' strategy, referring to the difference between Jewish claims to Israel premised on exclusive biological descent, Samaritan Israelite acknowledgments of shared descent, and the 'Verus Israel' tradition in Christianity, which disavows the importance of descent. Using this framework, it makes various general conclusions about the construction of ethnic identity itself, including the inadequacy of treating descent claims as the sine qua non of ethnicity and role played in any given vision of ethnic identity by the individual creativity of a given author.

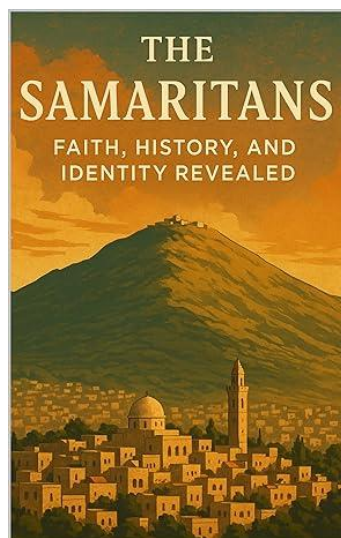

#### **[Tel Balata, Shechem \(Nablus\): A City That Shaped History](#)**

Shechem — known today as Nablus — is one of the oldest and most significant cities in the ancient world, yet few truly understand its depth, power, and meaning.

In this episode, I sit down with archaeologist Christopher Eames to explore Tel Balata, the ancient site of Shechem, located between Mount Gerizim and Mount Ebal.
