The Ancient Samaritan Pentateuch Draped in Mourning. The Samaritan Pentateuch is one of the most ancient manuscripts in existence and is treasured above everything by the remnant of the Samaritan Colony at Shechem in Palestine. When the Samaritans learned of the death of their beloved and very helpful friend, Edward K. Warren of Three Oaks, Mich., Past President of the World's Sunday School Association, they draped their synagogue at Shechem in black and wore mourning for a month. Most impressive of all was the "fact that the very ancient Samaritan Pentateuch was also draped in black for the same length of time. Mr. Warren had visited the Samaritans at the time when the World's Sunday School Convention was held in Jerusalem in 1904. Since then he had been their constant friend and had helped the "remnant" on many occasions.
